

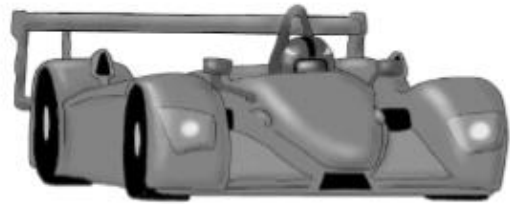
WORD CHOICES

6. When a group of children are able to **work together** in class without falling out, are they showing how well they can **co-operate** or how well they can **correspond**?

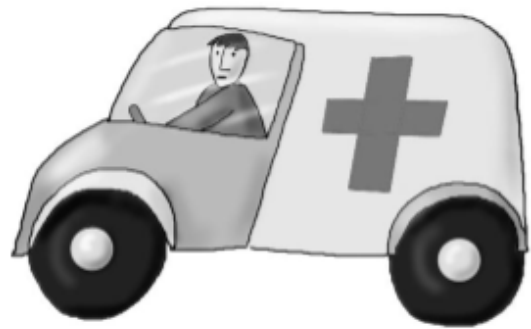
7. Sometimes, a TV ad can make you rush out and buy some new product. Is the ad being **pervasive** or **persuasive**?
