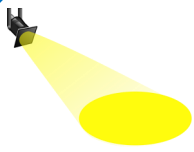




Welcome

Making Predictions

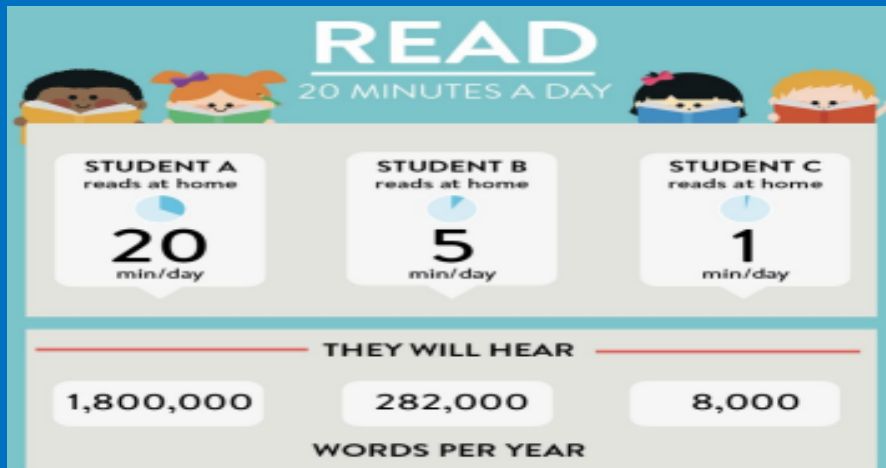
Predictions can be made before you start reading as well as at key points during a story.

- From the cover, what might this book be about?
- What is happening now? What happened before? What will happen next?
- Do you think might happen? Why/why not?
- What is there in this paragraph that tells us what might happen next?



'Every Day, Every Night'

Reading takes place in school every day and we believe it is important for all children to be reading for at least ten minutes after school as well. Ask your child questions about what they have been reading to check their understanding and record this reading in their reading record. You can also record any reading that is done at home, including books from home.

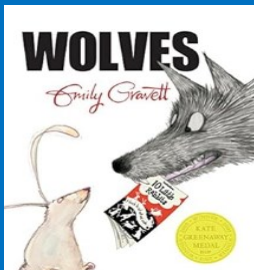
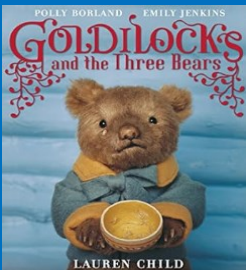
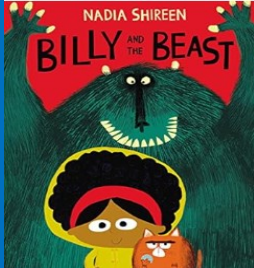
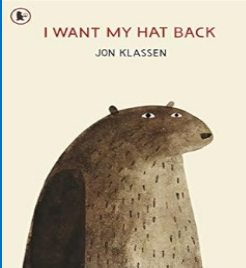
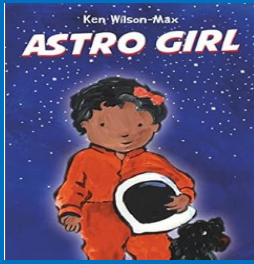
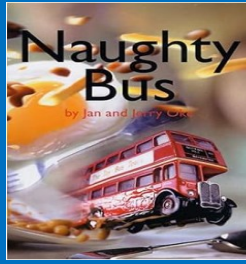
Reading Volunteers

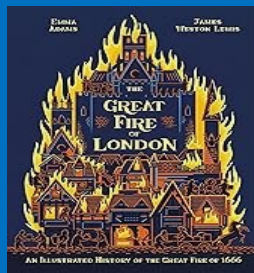


Books we are sharing in class

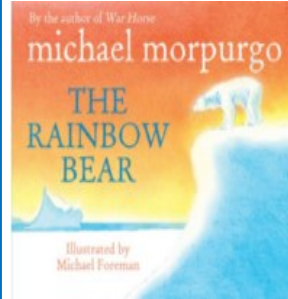

Please find some book recommendations for books you might like to share at home.

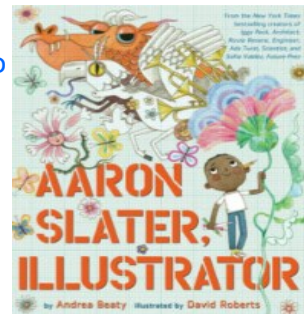


The Rainbow Bear By Michael Morpurgo
